FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

The People of Israel Cried Out

For the past few years, the Washington Board of Rabbis has partnered with Rabbi Avi Straussberg of the local branch of HADAR to offer classes to the rabbis. She's an excel-

lent teacher and I enjoy her style and the material she teaches - mainly lessons from Hasidic rabbis. Currently she's teaching from a collection of Torah commentaries known as the *Netivot Shalom* - written by the Slonimer Rebbe, Rabbi Shalom Noach Berezovsky (1911-2000). I wanted to share her latest lesson with you.

The Slonimer Rebbe was teaching about mourning and grief. He noticed in the *Book of Esther* that Mordechai dressed in sackcloth and had ashes on his head in mourning for the impending doom by the evil Haman. And he also noticed that the people of Israel in Egypt cried out in anguish from the cruelty and burden of servitude. Yet out of those two terrible moments, triumph prevailed. Mordechai was able to convince Esther to approach the king to change his mind. And God heard the cry of the Hebrew slaves and sent Moses to deliver them out of Egyptian bondage.

The point, the Slonimer Rebbe teaches, is that there is hope in the midst of despair. It may seem counterintuitive.

When we are mourning the death of a loved one or when we cry out against attacks on social justice or when we cry out for the Israeli hostages in Gaza, we may feel that all is lost. We may be crying that there is no hope. We may be feeling lost and disconnected from God.

But the act of crying out and active mourning actually expresses hope. Our cry, the Slonimer Rebbe says, reflects our desire to have the situation change. We want to see blessings in the midst of loss. We want to see justice triumph over evil. We want the Messiah to come to save us and bring about an age of peace and harmony. As the Rebbe teaches: "the light of the Messiah depends on the Jewish people's refusal to accept their situation."

How did the miracle of Passover happen? Why were the people miraculously redeemed from Egypt? Because the people cried out to God. How will our circumstances change and how can we be agents for change? By wanting it to happen; by praying, by working with likeminded people.

May your Passover holiday be meaningful and may we all be blessed with justice and light.

On My Mind

As is the case for many American Jews, Passover evokes a lot of powerful memories and messages. I surely have many fond memories of many Passovers of years past.

Growing up, the lead-up to Passover was itself a huge deal — gradually changing over dishes and locking off various areas as we stored away the items that we couldn't use during Passover. We also had a tradition of making homemade chopped liver; so, I recall getting out the grinder and mixing the liver and onions, whose smell permeated our home for days. Of course, we made charoset too, but that was less memorable.

As for Passover itself ... with four brothers, our own immediate family started at seven, and our home was typically the gathering place for our extended family. In hindsight, I suspect that one reason that this was the case was that we five were a bit of a handful and other relatives, wisely, may have wanted our rambunctiousness to be confined to our house rather than their own? In any case, the siblings of each of my parents, accompanied by many cousins, and often a few guests to boot, all squeezed into our relatively small dining room, overflowed into our living room, and threatened to extend into the main entryway. It required redeployment of every chair we had, and sometimes a few borrowed from neighbors. A consistent feature was the 'children's table', where all manner of shenanigans would take place. The 'oldest child' at that table was nominally 'in-charge' and responsible for maintaining some semblance of order, but in actuality, he/she had no chance.

My father was always the leader of these extended family gatherings and very capably led our *Seders*. Long before they became increasingly more engaging, we relied upon a collection of classic, wine-stained *Maxwell House Hagaddahs* (dark blue cover), complete with the "Thees" and "Thous" and bland illustrations. The reading parts were rotated around the table, and often, an awkward moment arose if the task of reading the paragraph about the wicked child fell to a brother or cousin that we actually regarded as such, as if it somehow confirmed our sentiment. We thoroughly enjoyed the many songs sprinkled throughout the *Seder*, though there were collective groans when my father demonstrated just how badly he could mangle the tunes.

It was a true mark of transition when, in the latter years of his life, my father ceded the role of leader of the annual gatherings, now consisting mostly of the brothers and our own families, to me. It felt awkward, and at first, I resisted it, but I gradually gained confidence and felt emboldened to introduce innovations that were mostly well-received by the next generation; home-made Haggadahs, which I cobbled together – long before the computer age made this easy – which incorporated modern language and sentiments. A Jeopardy-type game. A pre-planned afikomen scavenger hunt with a succession of clues that sent each child on a tailored trip through the house in search of 'his/her' afikomen. One funny aside; it seems that one child must have cheated and used a 'substitute' because years later we came back across one of these specially hidden afikomens.

These days, the highlight of our Passover season is the process of making charoset, though I confess that we also sometimes make it at other times of the year. Long ago, I discovered that *charoset* was not necessarily just the 'traditional' recipe of apples, walnuts, cinnamon and wine that I'd grown up on. I started collecting recipes from around the world and, sometimes with the help of enthusiastic children, began producing a variety of batches that are now a conversation piece, especially for the *Seders* that we attend elsewhere, should they be receptive to us bringing it.

May all of your own Passovers offer inspiration and fond memories for you and yours.

that means, especially as we approach our Passover observance, the one holiday in our annual cycle that symbolizes our people becoming free from tyranny. As a Jewish American I have been struggling lately with the meaning of freedom here and how people in leadership have been attempting to redefine it, especially freedom of speech. I am referring to the actions of the Trump administration towards people protesting (on college campuses) the Israeli government policies in Gaza. Whether I agree with what those protesters said is irrelevant; if they can be arrested for saying things I disagree with, simply for saying those things, what will happen when I or people I know and support, protest some other policy? The arrests and deportations of US citizens, residents and green card holders endanger everyone's future. As Rabbi Artson, a leader in the Conservative movement and Dean of Rabbinic Studies at American Jewish University, reminds us in the quote above, having freedom consistently in our lives means we need to keep reaching for it.

The main ritual of Passover preparation is ridding our homes of all grain and leavened products (*chametz*). To actually throw out our food would be wasteful. The rabbis 1500 years ago devised a legal fiction that would permit us to leave the food in our homes. By selling the *chametz* to someone not obligated to observe the holiday, we fulfill the commandment "do not have *chametz* in your possession."

Shaare Tefila and the Arts


Jews, besides being people of the book, are people of the arts. From the artists of the Torah, including Miriam and her timbrels, David the poet (and king), and Bezalel – the artist singled out by God for making the Tabernacle (Exod 31: 1-5) to the artists of today (too numerous to count), Jews have always thought about and been involved with the arts. In fact, my first visit to Shaare Tefila was to see an exhibit of my mother's artwork in the Winer Family Gallery. Our synagogue celebrates art in other ways, from the architectural design of our sanctuary, to the Torah coverings and styles of Torah that we prefer and use, to the tile project underway for Shaare Tefila's anniversary, and so many more.

My love of the arts, passed down through innumerable generations has made it that much harder to see the Kennedy Center lose its creative heart over the last few weeks. But it is not just the Kennedy Center that has been impacted. Grants available to other theaters from the National Endowment for the Arts now come with limits on what the theaters can show and who they can hire. These are limitations on the ability of artistic directors to express their viewpoints and on audiences to benefit from those differing views. This is an existential threat to the arts, including to our neighbor, Olney Theatre Center.

Olney Theatre Center not only shares geography with Shaare Tefila, it also has a shared history with us. Many will recall that Olney Theatre offered synagogue members discounted tickets to see Fiddler during its 2023-2024 season (and had a workshop for our *Chavaya* students), but we should also recall that Olney Theatre often served host to our Shabbat services while Shaare Tefila's current building was under construction.

I hope that those who are so moved will join me in helping a good neighbor and longtime friend of the synagogue in its time of need. How can you show your support to Olney Theatre? Attend a show (and bring a friend), make a donation, or even attending the Olney Theatre Gala on June 1 (which Elissa and I are co-chairing). Repairs Are Being Carried Out ...

As you may have noticed, we are pleased to report that needed repairs are being carried out on the Bridge-Walkway leading to/from the Administrative area.

Alas, the concrete there had deteriorated and needed to be replaced. Once the existing concrete has been removed, we will also be able to fully assess the condition of the bridge base and make any needed repairs to that as well.

The repair work began on March 27. With allowance for weather-related delays, the repairs could potentially take as long as two weeks, though we are hoping that it will require less time.

IMPORTANT: While this repair is being carried out, this entry can NOT be used at all; the area will be cordoned off and the administrative doors to/from the outside will remain locked. All general access and deliveries will need to be through the "main entry" doors nearest the Chapel and Main Sanctuary.

FYI - There is no electronic access, intercom or buzzer system, nor an alarm pad located at the main entrance! In order to gain entry at that door, **please plan on connecting, preferably IN ADVANCE, directly with a staff or volunteer who is already inside and can meet you at the main door.** A notice with emergency phone lines (the main office and my cell) has also been posted there.

CHAVURAH GROUP 10 GOES ON A FIELD TRIP...

As a group activity, on March 16, members of Shaare Tefila's *Chavurah* Group 10 visited the Josiah Henson Museum and Park. The museum and grounds are on land in Montgomery County that was part of the plantation where Josiah Henson was enslaved before fleeing to Canada and becoming a free man. He later helped other slaves to freedom on the Underground Railroad. His autobiography, depicting the hardships and cruelty of slavery, became the inspiration for Harriet Beecher Stowe's Uncle Tom's Cabin.

From our docent, who was very knowledgeable and informative, we learned about:

- Josiah's life and legacy,
- · life as a slave, particularly on the plantation,
- the restored house containing the exhibits about Josiah's life and slavery.
- the restored slave quarters,
- · the ongoing archeological dig on the grounds, and
- the history behind the museum and its significance to Montgomery County's history.

After the trip, Shaare Tefila received a lovely thank you note, directed to Michael & Anita Froehlich.

Dear Anita & Mike;

It was my pleasure to guide your group from Shaare Tefila through the Josiah Henson Museum. As we get closer to Pesach, it is a good idea to reflect on the slave experience, and I can't think of a better role model for someone enduring the horrors and overcoming that experience to bring light and hope to the world than Josiah Henson.

I appreciate your [contribution; that money] will be used to bring new visitors to the museum, so thank you for that.
